Foley Receives ACA Accreditation Again

The American Camping Association (ACA) announced this past summer that Camp Foley has received ACA Accredited Camp status for the 1998 season.

"An independent evaluation by camp experts is very important," emphasized Dr. Margery Scanlin, Director of ACA's Standards program. "By being ACA accredited, Camp Foley demonstrates that they care about their campers and comply with the highest quality standards designed specifically for camps."

"Parents expect their children to attend accredited schools. They also deserve a camp experience that is reviewed and accredited by an expert, independent organization," stated Scanlin.

"ACA accreditation is very important to our camp," said Marie Schmid, Director. "While the program is strictly voluntary, we owe it to our campers and parents to have the best operation that we possibly can. ACA Accreditation demonstrates our commitment to quality camp programming." The American Camping Association is the only independent

accrediting organization reviewing camp operations in the country. Their nationally recognized standards program focuses primarily on the program quality and health and safety aspects of a camp's operation. The standards are continually reviewed, refined and updated. The accreditation process is quite comprehensive and thorough. At least once every three years, two or more trained camp professionals, not affiliated with the camp seeking accreditation, review the camp's operations and procedures while the camp is in session. Currently, ACA accreditation is held by only 25 percent of day and resident camps.



Fun and friends is what camp is all about.

The American Camping Association, founded in 1910, is a 5,000-member non-profit organization committed to the continuing values and benefits the camp experience offers. Its membership encompasses all segments of the camp movement including non-profit, independent operations, religiously affiliated organizations and public/municipal agencies.

Getting to Foley is Easy!

Our campers arrive to Foley by car or charter buses departing from the Minneapolis/St. Paul airport and from Edina, MN. The majority of our campers take the bus which is beneficial to first time campers. Camp counselors on the bus introduce them to campers their own age, sing camp songs and answer questions. It is a lot easier for a parent to say good-bye waving as the bus pulls away or as the child boards the plane. If flying, Foley counselors will meet your child at the gate upon arrival and have your child call home to reassure you that he or she has arrived safely.

When the buses arrive at Foley, the entire camp community gathers to greet the campers as they disembark. They immediately meet their cabin mates and with the help of their counselors are able to settle into their cabins quickly. Foley counselors will assist younger campers with their luggage, unpacking, and making up their beds.

If arriving by car, plan your arrival between 1:00 and 2:00 p.m. A Foley welcome includes meeting counselors, walking to the camper's cabin and touring the facility. We encourage parents that would like to see camp to pick their camper up at the end of the session. By doing this, the camper, who now has the sense of camp 'ownership', is a wonderful tour guide full of camp tales as you meet counselors, see the activity areas and wander into the cabins.




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What Makes Camp Rock?



Perhaps you just enjoy hanging out with your cabin mates. Whatever it is, we are sure it will put a smile on your face and create a lasting memory.



At camp, what will I do all day?

Of course your day will be filled with a lot of fun and games, but there is so much more! Activities like those listed to the side could all be a part of your daily schedule! There are also specially planned programs in the evening such as playing capture-the-flag with the entire camp community or roasting marshmallows with your cabin group over an open

campfire. Other special theme events and activities will fill your days and keep you busy!

Who will help me have fun at camp? How do they know how to care for me?

Our counselors are individuals, age 18 and older, from around the world. They have been chosen especially to work at Foley because of a special quality they have – they enjoy working with kids. Our counselors come 11 days before our first

campers arrive for a special training for camp counselors only. During this training time, the counselors not only play games and sing songs; they also work hard at getting ready for you. They want to help you experience new things and to have the best time ever!

Do I get to choose what I want to do at camp?

The answer is simple...Yes! You are able to create your own schedules. Depending on your age, you are able to choose five or six activities for a three-day schedule. At the end of the three-day schedule, you can choose all new activities or stick with the same activities to improve your skill.

Summer Camp—An Investment in Your Child's Future

In today's world, children are continually bombarded by several external influences that can affect their self-esteem. Whether it be at school, work, or on the playground, children are influenced in

many different ways affecting them either positively or negatively. As a parent, you have the chance to help your child find a place where he or she can get that positive experience.

In a survey conducted by the American Camping Association, 76 percent of the parents polled view themselves as a vital influence on their child's self-esteem. Nearly half of those surveyed feel their children's self-esteem needs improvement and they cite youth leaders, including camp staff, as those who can affect a child's self-esteem. Over 75 percent of the parents polled agreed with what

has already been proven by researchers that a child's early years are the most important to his or her development and that the child's environment is the most important factor in forming his or her personality. According to Dr. Michael Popkin, a child and family therapist, president of Active Parenting Publishers, and spokesperson for the ACA survey, "That's why parents should seek out activities like camp, which can give their children more exposure to

an environment that encourages them to learn, to belong, and to grow, the building blocks to self-esteem." Nearly a third of the parents agreed with Dr. Popkin by saying that camp did indeed improve a child's self-esteem.

Camp offers children the chance to be themselves without any of the external pressures so often experienced in every day life. It allows the child to learn how to be independent and how to make decisions. Camp is a place where the child will grow and have new experiences. It is a place where positive self-esteem is not a question—it's the answer.

Advantages of the Two Week Session over a One Week Session

How Do We Provide Campers with the Opportunities to Make Friends?

One of the most frequently asked questions from parents of prospective campers is, "Will my child be okay if he/she isn't coming to camp with a friend?" Yes! Every session many campers do venture to Foley on their own for many different

reasons. Foley will assist parents in arranging for children to meet, write, or call another camper prior to camp by providing phone numbers and addresses. Prior to opening day, careful attention is given to composing cabin groups. One important consideration is creating a

blend of campers conducive to formulating new friends. On the bus, campers are introduced to others who are of similar age and, many times, to their cabin mates. Cabin counselors personally welcome each camper upon arrival to camp and introduce them to their cabin mates. The first day is spent as a cabin unit getting acquainted and acclimated to camp life. Each cabin participates in a variety of events actively involving the entire cabin. Cabin groups work together with their counselors on conflict resolutions, utilizing a positive "cabin meeting" approach. All campers participate in an evening program that stresses respect, and acceptance and cooperation among all members of the group. Many other camp events also foster friendship building including: camp banquets, friendship campfires, autograph signing and all camp activities.

What if I come without a friend? Who will be my friends?

At the end of every summer session, our campers are always commenting on the strong friendships that have been created during their stay. Some campers do come to camp with friends from home, but most new campers come without knowing anyone. This does not last long however. Upon your arrival to camp, you will meet your counselor, cabin mates, and other

campers – instant friends! Kids come to camp to have fun and nothing else really matters. You can be whoever you want to be at camp and always be guaranteed to have a friend at your side.

Where will I stay while I am at camp?

All of our campers and counselors live in cabins. There are two counselors and eight to twelve campers of the same age assigned to each cabin. You will have your own bunk, locker, and shelving space. Bathrooms and showers are a short walk from your cabin. They are very similar in design to a locker room. There are private bathroom stalls and private showers.



Is the food any good?

Campers are always surprised after their first meal at camp

- they like the food! After watching movies about camp, people assume that all camp food is awful – we have proven this false. Since this is considered our 'home', why would we want to eat horrible food all summer? Typical breakfast meals range from pancakes to scrambled eggs to waffles. Lunches include soups, various sandwiches, and good energizing food to get us through the day. Our dinners range from tacos to turkey and mashed potatoes to the all-time camp favorite, tator-tot hotdish! There is always a salad bar option for dinner and a vegetarian option for all meals.







Foley Safety & Endurance Swim Test

Splash! On arrival day campers will discover changes in the swim test. What is required to pass? A camper must properly put on his or her lifejacket, jump into deep water and comfortably swim 25 yards. After removing his or her lifejacket, the camper must jump into deep water, tread water for 5 minutes, and confidently swim approximately 50 yards using either the front crawl or breaststroke.

Endurance and confidence of swimming in the lake are key factors in all aspects of the test.

When a camper passes the Foley Safety and Endurance Swim Test, he or she will be able to participate in boardsailing, diving, snorkeling, and waterskiing. If a camper does not pass the Test, he or she will be placed in the appropriate swim level class or into a swimming endurance building class.






